PARTNERSHIP AWARDS AND ACHIEVEMENTS

- <u>State Farm</u> and Rio Salado entered into a partnership to provide employees educational opportunities through employer paid benefits.
- Dr. Jennifer Gresko was selected to join Governor Katie Hobbs' Educator Retention Task Force from a pool of 650+ applicants.
- The <u>Society of Cable Telecommunications Engineers</u> and Rio Salado partnered to create a new Associate of Applied Science in Broadband Telecommunications.
- The <u>Career Paths in Construction Trades program with SMCC</u> launched to help students complete their Rio Salado HSE and ESL coursework and SMCC's Construction Trades Institute program.
- Rio Salado was selected to serve as a sub-grantee for a <u>\$4.6</u> million grant from the National Science Foundation to provide microelectronics and nanomanufacturing training for veterans.
- Rio Salado was awarded \$1,490,796 as part of a Beyond Completion Challenge grant by the Strada Education Foundation in partnership with the Taskforce on Higher Education and Opportunity to help improve career and life opportunities for students.
- Rio Salado's <u>Avanzar Project received a \$2,939,518</u> Department of Education Developing Hispanic-Serving Institutions Title V grant to expand educational opportunities for Hispanic students and other underserved students. Rio Salado received HSI designation in 2021.
- <u>American Family Insurance</u> Institute for Corporate and Social Impact donated \$90,000 to fund an Early Childhood Education Program for dual enrollment students.



- The Lake Michigan College Powered by Rio partnership served 68 students in six articulated courses in three languages: Sign Language, French, and Cybersecurity. The colleges will expand the partnership by adding 20 Rio Salado language courses in Japanese, Spanish, German, and Chinese.
- The Adult Education team hosted a focus group as part of its U.S. Department of Education funded CAEL-led Connected Pathways project; an initiative to develop a national careerexploration technology system that will help Black, Latinx, and other underserved learners make informed choices as they navigate complex educational and career options. The team was also invited to represent the state of Arizona during a three-day training in Washington D.C. to become trainers for the national leadership initiative, Teaching Skills That Matter Cohort 5.
- The college launched a partnership with <u>The Guild Opportunity</u> <u>Platform</u> to serve as an online provider, welcoming 116 students who enrolled in 273 courses through employer tuition assistance benefits.
- <u>Master Electronics</u> selected Rio Salado to serve as the online educational provider for its employees as part of a new partnership with MCCCD.
- Rio Salado joined MCCCD and Education Design Lab to celebrate the launch of the <u>Maricopa Growth Engine Fund</u>. The lab highlighted Rio Salado's work and presented a check for \$300,000 (part of a \$1.2 million grant) to support the development of high-demand microcredential pathways in IT and advanced manufacturing.















DIVISION OF PUBLIC SERVICE AWARDS AND ACHIEVEMENTS

KJZZ led all year long as the #1 Valley News Station—and was listed as a top 5 national news station in July 2022.



SPOT 127 received a National Television Arts and Sciences (NATAS) Rocky Mountain Southwest Regional Student Production Emmy Award.

KBACH celebrated its 30th anniversary with special programming and remained a top classical station in the country, ranking 7th nationally among public radio stations.











LEADING

- The college reported significant increases in enrollments and instructional hours, especially among adult education, educator prep, and dual enrollment students. Dual headcount increased by more than 1,300 for fall 2022-23, compared to 2021-22.
- The <u>Higher Learning Commission approved two new</u> <u>bachelor's degrees for fall 2023</u>: a Bachelor of Arts in Education with dual certification in Elementary/Special Education and a Bachelor of Applied Science in Public Safety Administration.
- Rio Salado welcomed the Ministry of Education and Culture of the State of Sonora Secretary Aaron Grageda Bustamante, the Sonora Department of Education, Arizona-Mexico Commission and Maricopa Community College presidents in October to discuss how educational leaders can collaborate and partner to provide opportunities for students. Rio Salado shared updates about its workforce development, microcredentials and online English Language Learning for Educators initiatives.



ENGAGING

- Rio Salado joined the Tempe Chamber of Commerce to host the annual <u>State of the District</u> with **Representative Greg Stanton** at our conference center.
- The DEIB Committee hosted our <u>MLK Day celebration</u> with a keynote address by Tempe Council member Berdetta Hodge and our <u>Black History Month</u> celebration featuring a discussion with Dr. Wanda Tucker about retracing her family's history as part of the 1619 project. It also hosted its annual Day of Remembrance for employees to honor people who have passed away, and helped host <u>Women's History Month</u>, <u>Asian</u> <u>Pacific Islander Month</u>, <u>International Education Week</u>, and <u>Native American Heritage</u> month celebrations. The DEIB Council resumed work on its strategic plan; launched a survey to measure outcomes; and began researching Native American Land Acknowledgment.
- Our philanthropic spirit continues to shine. Employees volunteered to help Feed My Starving Children, walked for the Lymphoma Research Foundation, and joined forces with Dsquared Homes to build sleeping mats for people who are homeless. Our faculty hosted its annual auction to benefit the Jo C. Bennett Student Assistance Fund, which provides emergency assistance to students. We joined MCCCD for the annual Be a Student's Hero Day fundraiser and hosted our Dash with Splash 5k/10k fundraiser to benefit Adult ACE students. President Smith hosted two tables at the We are United Annual Community Breakfast, inviting top Rio Salado employee donors. Rio Salado won the 2022 United Way Chancellor cup for its outstanding fundraising efforts, which raised \$20,650 from 93 donors.

INNOVATING

- Two Rio Salado cohorts completed <u>ACUE's Inclusive Teaching</u> for Equitable Learning microcredential. The cohorts included 53 employees who earned 253 ACUE badges and 49 who earned the full microcredential. Rio Salado's ACUE team and cohort members provided substantial feedback to ACUE in regards to making the course even more inclusive for all college employees. Rio Salado will be among the first colleges to pilot the new course.
- Rio Salado launched three new programs to help students fill demands for skilled workers: Associate in Arts (AA), Emphasis in Community Health, Certificate of Completion in Esports and Certificate of Completion in Real Estate: Prelicense.
